Course Description and Objectives:

The course centers around major perspectives on international relations and decision making as applied through a variety of political simulations. These simulations require students to adopt a particular country's or leader's perspective and create solutions in conjunction with other students acting as distinct members of the international community. For instance, students participate in a simulation detailing the ongoing Egypt/Ethiopia dispute over the Nile river. After discussing and agreeing on compromises for this real world issue, students apply knowledge to the constitutional convention of a newly formed fictional country with a muddled historical past filled with civil conflict and ethnic divisions. The course culminates in a Model United Nations crisis committee centered around ongoing events between Ukraine and Russia. Through discussion, debates, and simulations students gain new theoretical perspectives on international affairs and applied these theories to real world problems.

Objectives:

- Understand and articulate major theories of international relations;
- Describe some of the problems facing the world community today and some possible solutions to these problems;
- Understand and articulate theories of decision making in everyday life, historical settings, and modern politics;
- Practice group interaction, facilitation, and relationship-building skills;
- Practice developing and writing a paper as well as delivering a presentation.

Assignments and Evaluation:

<u>In-Class Debates & Simulations</u>: Throughout the course, there will be numerous in-class debates devoted primarily to the debate/discussion of key issues facing international relations today. During these debates, and simulations the class will be broken up into several, equally-represented groups who will be charged with making the case for and defending the particular side of the debate they are assigned.

<u>Model United Nations Debrief:</u> This course will culminate in a Model United Nations crisis committee. The actual content of the crisis will be announced in class in accordance with current events. Each student will be assigned a country and be required to participate in a Model United Nations exercise. After the simulation, students will write an essay detailing how their assigned country acted during the simulation. Was the country behaving as a realist? A liberal or constructivist? This essay will

bring together the theoretical component of the course with hands-on analysis of difficult problems foreign policy leaders face during crisis scenarios.
